The PE and Sport Premium

The government is providing additional funding to improve provision of physical education and sport in primary schools. Schools receive PE and sport premium funding based on the number of pupils in EYFS to 6. This funding - provided jointly by the Departments for Education, Health and Culture, Media and Sport - will be allocated to primary school Headteachers and is ring-fenced and therefore can only be spent on provision of PE and sport in schools.

Purpose of the Funding:

In the Academic Year 2021-2022 Priestley Smith School will receive £16,297 This year we have used our PE and Sport Premium Grant to enable our primary pupils to access additional swimming sessions via Wilson Stuart Special School. Learning to swim is an important life skill especially for children who are Vision Impaired and is essential for all of our pupils. We have found that intensive blocks of swimming are the most effective way to support our pupils to build on their skills over time. We have also made the most of all opportunities for our pupils to be active by utilise our Play Coordinator to lead and promote playground games and activities during breaktime.

To ensure all students have ongoing weekly support to develop swimming skills throughout Primary education.

- To ensure all students develop confidence in the water.
- To ensure as many students as possible can swim 10 metres, thus increasing their confidence in water.
- To ensure as many students as possible can swim 25 metres, thus meeting the statutory requirements of the national curriculum for PE.
- To ensure that as many students as possible can perform safe selfrescue over a varied distance so they are confident and safe in water.

- Continue to negotiate weekly pool space for all year groups FS to end KS4 at Wilson Stuart School.
- Provide specialist swimming instructor within existing resources.
- Provide additional qualified swimming instructor and lifeguard (over and above existing resources) Implemented.
- Provide additional staffing to support additional needs (over and above existing resources) Implemented.

- 8% of Primary pupils are able to swim over 10 metres.
- 24% of Primary pupils are able to swim 25m.
- 95% of pupils have increased their confidence in the water.
- 14% of pupils are able to perform safe self-rescue.

Next Steps 2021-22 If Covid restrictions allow

• To ensure all students have ongoing weekly support to develop swimming skills throughout Primary education.

SLT and Governors have agreed to ring fence funding to ensure the maximum amount of pupils leave the school being able to swim. Swimming is seen as a vital skill and an important way to stay healthy for our students. They are committed to providing ongoing weekly swimming support to all groups even if **Sports Premium is** withdrawn.
